#### GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

All exhibits will be received on Monday, September 13 from 3:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M. All exhibits must be removed on Saturday, September 18 from 8:00 P.M. to 11:00 P.M. Premium checks will be available for pick up from 8:00 P.M. to 11:00 P.M. on Saturday, September 18.

- All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Denver Fair.
- 2. All persons making entries of exhibits should acquaint themselves with the premium list and regulations. Follow closely the classes given. Premiums will not be given in unclassified categories or to anyone who enters in wrong age group.
- 3. The Denver Fair Committee reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations.
- 4. Only one exhibit will be made in a class by an exhibitor. Two entries in one class by the same exhibitor disqualifies both entries.
- 5. Any exhibit in one class may not compete in any other class.
- NO discriminating markings shall be left on any exhibit until it is judged.
- All exhibits must be new. Exhibits laundered, dry cleaned, or worn will be disqualified.
- 8. Exhibits that were entered in prior years are not eligible to compete for premium money or ribbons.
- 9. When there is no competition in a class, the judges shall award the premium on merit of the individual exhibit. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered.
- 10. Judging is based on creativity, workmanship, and finishing. During the judging, the building is closed to everyone except the judges, fair officials, and necessary attendants. The decision of the judges will be final in all cases. All protests regarding judging must be made in writing and must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal. Such protests must be filed at the Fair Office within 24 hours of the occurrence.
- 11. All exhibitors enter their displays at their own risk. However, reasonable care will be taken to protect the displays.
- 12. No early removal will be allowed unless warranted by the Denver Fair Committee. If you cannot leave your exhibit in the show until Saturday 8:00 P.M., please do not enter it. Early removal will forfeit premium money and ribbon awarded to each winning exhibit. There will be no exceptions!
- 13. You may pick up your premium check when you remove your exhibits between 8:00 P.M. and 11:00 P.M. on Saturday.
- 14. No alcoholic beverages are permitted on the fairgrounds.
- 15. Smoking is prohibited in exhibition building and tents.
- 16. Any articles not removed Saturday, September 18 by 12:00 midnight become the property of the Denver Fair Committee.
- 17. Premium checks are null and void after November 18, 2021. Kindly cash checks immediately. The premium account will be closed on November 18, 2021, therefore it will not be possible to make exceptions to this policy.
- 18. Any premium checks not claimed during the fair will be forfeited and considered a donation to the Denver Fair. The Fair Committee will accept a self-addressed stamped envelope for payment of premiums.
- 19. Premium complaints must be filed no later than October 10, 2021. Call (717) 336-4072. This includes problems with premium checks.

#### SHOW - Wednesday, September 15, 2021 at 6:00 P.M.

#### RULES:

- 1. Ownership All cattle must be owned by the exhibitor by May 1, 2021. Cattle must be shown by owner.
- 2. *Eligibility* Any youth aged between ages 8-21 is eligible to compete. Exhibitor will be listed by age as of January 1 of current year. There is a \$6.00 per head entry fee. Denver Fair reserves the right to limit space & quantity of entrants. All local school districts will be considered first.
- 3. *Entries* All entries must be mailed, along with the entry fee, to the chairperson by August 28, 2021. Please make checks payable to: The Denver Fair Committee, Inc. Entry form can be found on page 17. See page 68 for the Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship form.
- 4. *Care* Straw bedding will be provided by the Denver Fair Committee. Feed, feed pans, water buckets, hay and fans must be provided by the exhibitor who must see that animals are fed & cared for the duration of the ENTIRE fair. The Denver Fair Committee will provide a night watchperson to stay with the animals. All cattle are required to have neck ties and halters at all times. Exhibitors will be held solely responsible for any loss, injury, or damage arising from any animals exhibited by him/her. Each exhibitor is **required** to help clean up livestock area upon removal of animals or will subject to forfeiture of premiums.
- 5. Health Requirements A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after July 15, 2021 is required. The Denver Fair, 801 Main Street, Denver, PA 17517 must be listed on the CVI. Entries showing clinical evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease or under quarantine for any disease shall not be admitted to the show. All entries must have official identification including either a USDA issued metal ear tag or an 840 RFID tag. Vaccines against the following: IBR, PI3, BRSV, BVD, are required. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age & older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time) is strongly recommended. All drug & vaccine labels must be followed including withdrawal periods. USE CAUTION WHEN FITTING YOUR ANIMALS. Be sure that all grooming products are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat & dairy animals, do not use it. If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting products is the cause of the condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

## In Memory of Dale S. Ench



- 1. *Ownership* Goats must be owned by exhibitor by June 1, 2021. Goats must be shown by owner except when the owner has more than one entry per class.
- 2. *Eligibility* Any youth aged between 8-21 is eligible to compete. Exhibitor will be listed by age as of January 1 of current year. **There** is a \$4.00 per head entry fee. The Denver Fair Committee reserves the right to limit space & quantity of entries. All local school districts will be considered first.
- 3. *Entries* All entries must be mailed, along with the entry fee, to the chairperson by August 28, 2021. Each exhibitor is allowed to show a maximum of four (4) market goats. All market goats must weigh between 50-120 pounds. There is a limit of ten (10) entries per exhibitor (Market or Breeding). Junior doe classes may not have freshened. Senior doe classes must have freshened at least one. Please make checks payable to: The Denver Fair Committee. Entry form can be found on page 17. See page 68 for the Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship form.
- 4. *Care* Straw bedding will be provided by the Denver Fair Committee. Feed, feed pans, water containers, hay, and fans must be provided by the exhibitor who must see that animals are fed & cared for the duration of the ENTIRE fair. The Denver Fair Committee will provide a night watchperson to stay with the animals. Exhibitors will be held solely responsible for any loss, injury, or damage arising from any animals exhibited by him/her. Each exhibitor is **required** to help clean up livestock area upon removal of animals or will be subject to forfeiture of premiums.
- 5. Health Requirements A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after July 15, 2021 is required. The Denver Fair, 801 Main Street, Denver, PA 17517 must be listed on the CVI. Entries showing clinical evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease or under quarantine for any disease shall not be admitted to the show. Official USDA scrapie animal ID is required. Official scrapie ID includes: USDA scrapie eartag, USDA approved custom scrapie eartag or USDA approved scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID or ISO compliant 15 digit eartag. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age & older (observe appropriate slaughter withdrawal time) is strongly recommended. All drug & vaccine labels must be followed including withdrawal periods. Anyone using artificial means to change the condition, form or shape of an animal will be disqualified from all classes in which they have entries at the discretion of the goat show committee.
- 6. **Time** All goats must be checked in & in assigned penning from 5:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. on Sunday, September 12, 2021. The removal time for goats will be Friday after the market livestock sale (approximately 10:00 P.M.)
- 7. Show Thursday, September 16, 2021 at 5:00 P.M. in the Livestock Ring.
- 8. Sale All sale market goats will be sold during the market livestock sale, Friday, September 17 at 6:00 P.M.

- 1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest, unless class requests it, select medium size specimens. Do not mix varieties.
- 2. These factors are generally used by the vegetable judge:
  - a. Trueness to variety, type. Pick the specimens from one variety.

b. Uniformity in size, shape and color.

- c. Pick out a perfect specimen, then select others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens or varying maturities.
- d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
- e. Condition and maturity. Be sure exhibits are of high quality.
- Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or soft brush.
- Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc., should have tops (leaves) removed leaving about 2" of stems.
- 3. Read premium material carefully and follow all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number, do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having the wrong number of specimens other than that stipulated.
- 4. All general rules of the Denver Fair must be followed (they are located in the front of the Denver Fair book) and the judge has the final decision in all exhibits. If a judge decides an entry is not worthy of a ribbon, no ribbon will be awarded.
- 5. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to correctly identify the vegetable or fruit and enter them in the correct class. Any entry entered in the wrong class by the exhibitor will not be judged or reclassified.
